## Honor Societies

Distinguished achievement is recognized by admission to Alpha Sigma Nu, national Jesuit honor society. The Society was founded in 1915 at Marquette University to honor a select number of students each year on the basis of scholarship, loyalty and service.

The name of Alpha Sigma Nu signifies the Greek words Adelphotos Skolastikon Nikephoron (company of honor students). At Saint Joseph's University, juniors and seniors who rank in the top 15% of their classes and have a QPA of at least 3.5 may apply for membership.

There is also an academic honor society for University College students, Alpha Sigma Lambda. This national society was founded in 1945 at Northwestern University. There are chapters across the United States, including nine in Jesuit colleges. Students who have completed 60 credits and have a QPA of at least 3.5 are eligible for membership.
