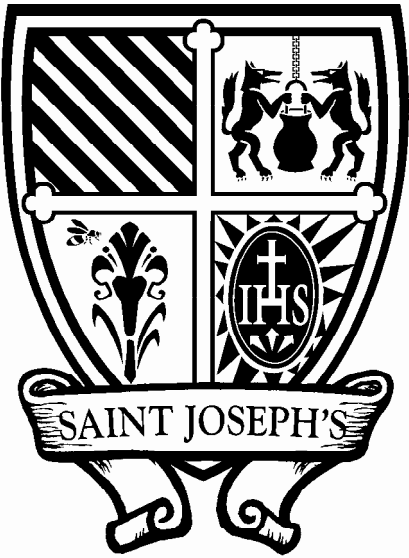

Computer Networking and Facilities

At present there are forty-three technologically equipped classrooms, seven computer teaching labs, two classrooms with mobile laptop labs, twenty-three classrooms with built in TV/VCR and DVD players, and six video-conferencing rooms. All University owned housing is connected to the campus voice and data networks. In total, there are more than 7000 network connections points in classrooms, labs, offices, and residence halls.

Student Sports/Recreation Center

The University's Student/Sports Recreation Complex is a versatile fitness center designed to accommodate the University community's need for exercise, recreation, and sports activities. The Sports/Recreation Complex consists of the Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse and the following:

240' by 120' four-court area, convertible for basketball, tennis, and volleyball;
220-yard indoor, four-lane, practice running track;
25 meter, 8-lane indoor pool with a 300 seat observation area;
4 racquetball/handball courts;
Spacious locker rooms and saunas; and equipment

Outside the Complex there is Finnesey Field, with a 400-meter, 6-lane Balsam track and an All Pro artificial surface field. Adjacent to the field are four tennis courts. Special recreational programs in Aquatics (Swimming, Life Saving, WSI, Scuba), CPR, and Basic First Aid.

It acquired its present name when it became a student residence. Edward J. Flanigan, Benefactor, 1922 Fund Drive.
Hogan Hall 81 Lapsey Lane	1965	Estate of Joseph Kohn.	Fr. Joseph S. Hogan, S.J., graduate of Saint Joseph's, Class of '03, and teacher here for more than 30 years.
Jordan Hall 41 Lapsey Lane	1959	William Sherrerd.	Rev. Patritius Jordan, S.J., member of original facutly in 1851, spent his entire teaching career at Saint Joseph's and died here in 1899.
LaFarge Residence	1970	Part of Gerhard Estate.	Rev. John LaFarge, S.J., 1880-1963, Jesuit editor and journalist for America magazine and founder of Catholic Interracial Movement.
Lonergan Hall	1932	Built as addition to Barbelin Hall on original parcel of property.	John E. Lonergan, Benefactor, 1922 Fund Drive. "The John E. Lonergan School of Mechanics" inscribed at entrance to building.
Mandeville Hall	1998	Built on original parcel of property purchased in 1922.	Owen A. Mandeville, businessman, entrepreneur, and philanthropist.

Wolfington Center for Ministry, Faith, and Service	1966	Designed by renowned architect William L. Price, the house was originally named "Handsword" and was acquired with the Estate of Margaret Gest. A student residence called Gest Hall from 1966 to 1980, the name was changed to Neumann Hall until 1995 when it acquired its permanent name. Irving Merlin.	Named by J. Eustace Wolfington '56, benefactor, trustee, and business executive, in honor of his mother, Mary Margaret Wolfington.
Wynnewood Hall	1982	Irving and Gertrude Bernett.	Name pre-dates University purchase.
